In the meantime, the European Union is trying to weaken the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) on top of extending twenty pesticide permits. Finally, Dutch citizens want the most toxic pesticides to be banned.

#### Pesticides do not remain in the valley, they go up the mountains

The airborne spread of pesticides is seriously underestimated. A new study in Italy shows that pesticides spread in the apple-growing region of South Tyrol do not remain in the orchards. They spread throughout the valley and end up high up in the mountains. They not only affect the

area of cultivation, but damage whole ecosystems. Read more.

### Glyphosate's "Hidden" Report - missing test on genotoxicity

A 'hidden' report by the French Agency for Food, Environmental and Occupational Health & Safety (ANSES) sheds light on the genotoxic risk of glyphosate. It was published after the newspaper Le Monde started a court case. The report highlights that an important genotoxicity test is



missing. And this test did not take place since. This is worrying and problematic, for part of the experts in the report express a warning of a genotoxic effect induced by glyphosate formulations. Read more.

Commission proposal to abolish environmental requirements for

The European Commission proposed to the member states the weakening of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP). The environmental requirements for farmers to receive subsidies would be drastically reduced. This goes directly against

scientific recommendations and societal demands. Instead of offering farmers long-term economic sustainability, the Commission makes farming even more environmentally unsustainable. Read more.

#### EU plans to extend permits for 20 pesticides, including 4 PFAS

The EU is planning to continue its toxic legacy. Despite the known dangers to health and the environment, no less than 20 pesticides are to receive an extended permit. Four of them are PFAS. This is one of the proposed decisions in this week's meeting of the pesticides committee of the Commission and Member States 'SCoPAFF'. PAN Europe provided expert advice on different
