### Glyphosate is polluting our waters all across Europe

Glyphosate and its metabolite AMPA are found in surface waters across 11 out of 12 countries spanning Europe, even during the end of the pesticide application season. From Poland to Portugal, from Belgium to Bulgaria, our waters are polluted by the herbicide. This is the disturbing finding in a <u>new</u>, report by PAN Europe and the Greens/EFA Group in the European Parliament. Read more.

#### Is glyphosate safe for health and the environment?

### EU glyphosate evaluation fails to acknowledge key mechanism that can lead to cancer

Scientists show how two EU regulatory agencies failed to fulfil their role as foreseen in EU pesticide law. A new scientific study reveals that ECHA dismissed important carcinogenicity findings and neglected evidence that glyphosate induces oxidative stress, a recognised mechanism that can lead to cancer. EFSA in its conclusion wrongfully relied on ECHA's classification of glyphosate as 'noncarcinogenic'. Read, more.

### European citizens support an EU ban of glyphosate

What do European citizens think of pesticide use, and more specific: what do they think about glyphosate? We have asked IPSOS to conduct an online representative public opinion poll in six countries: Denmark, France, Germany, Poland, Romania and Spain. The results of the full poll will be presented later in



September. We have singled out the question on glyphosate, because the renewal of Europe's most used herbicide is the topic of a heated debate and will be discussed in the EU Council's SCoPAFF committee on September 15th, with a vote expected to follow in October. Read more.

### Children are the first victims of neurotoxic pesticides

Recently we described that citizens are not protected against neurotoxic, effects of pesticides. Many active substances, especially insecticides but also fungicides and herbicides, affect the human brain. Authorities like the European Food Safety Authority admit that the long-term effects are not sufficiently examined. Medical specialists warn of a Parkinsons epidemic. But there is a perhaps even more devastating effect on the most vulnerable: the unborn and young children. Prof. P. Nicolopoulou Stamati MD. PhD from the University of Athens described the effects of pesticides on young children's brain in a recent webinar. Here is our transcription of her text. Read more.
