We found TFA contamination in wine across ten wine-producing EU countries. Highly toxic pesticides on sale for inexpert users

Karate, Delete, trade names for highly toxic pesticides sold to individuals online and in garden shops. We looked at gardening products and insect repellents in Belgium. PAN Netherlands did the same in their country. We found highly toxic substances for garden use, like the neurotoxic deltamethrin, the neurotoxic beekiller, acetamiprid and the PFAS pesticides lambda-cyhalothrin and flupyradifurone. Read more

Neurotoxic pesticides in Polish honey exceed safety limits An investigation of Polish honey reveals a deeply concerning level of

contamination. Greenpeace Poland found dangerous pesticides even in some of the honey produced by small, family-run apiaries. More than half of the samples contained acetamiprid, a brain-toxic neonicotinoid that PAN Europe asks to ban immediately. A

series of samples exceeded regulatory health safety limits, demonstrating that stronger restrictions must be applied. Read more

Administrative court of Toulouse confirms ban on glyphosate products The French Administrative Court of Appeal in Toulouse confirmed the earlier

ruling to cancel the renewal of two glyphosate-based products. In April 2025, the judges concluded that the authorities had failed to properly assess the risk these products pose to the environment, as required by law. Read more





Did you know that around 9 out of 10 plants in garden centres still contain

75% of so-called 'insect-friendly' garden plants toxic for insects

toxic residues when purchased? Often so much that insects that eat from them die, a Dutch photographer discovered. PAN Netherlands tested pesticide results on plants this spring: no major improvements compared to tests in previous years. 75% of so-called 'insect-friendly' garden plants are actually toxic to insects. The test received a lot of

attention in the Dutch media and was a topic in a much-watched TV consumer program. More information is available in the 'Stop toxic plants' by PAN Netherlands (in Dutch).
